

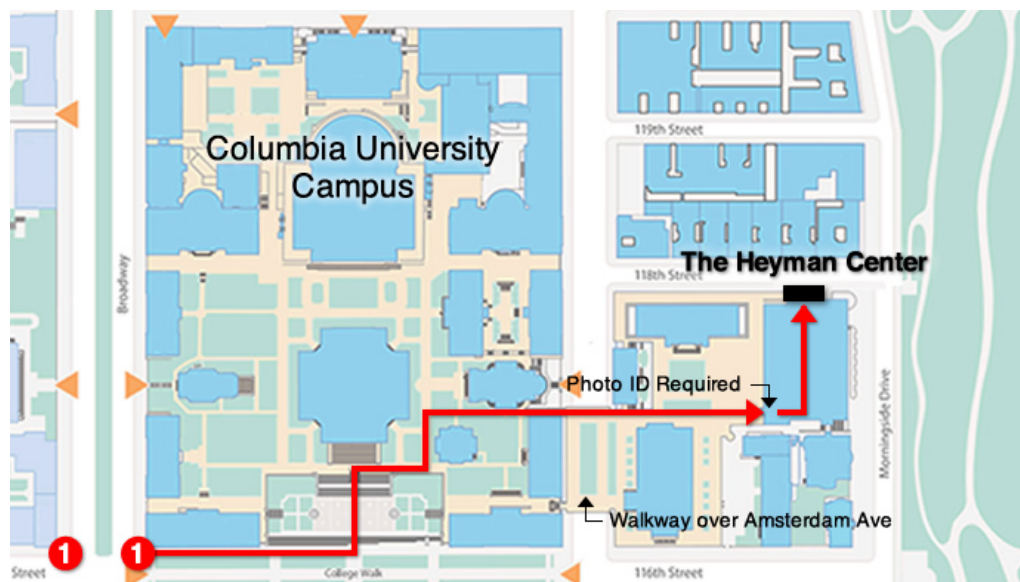
## **DIRECTIONS TO THE HEYMAN CENTER**

### **FROM 116TH STREET AND BROADWAY**

Enter the main Columbia gates at 116th Street and Broadway, and walk up the steps of Low Library. Turn right (east) at the top of the first set of steps, and keep walking east until you come to Philosophy Hall. Turn left (north) at Philosophy Hall and walk until you see a ramp on your right going (east) over Amsterdam Avenue.

Take that ramp and walk straight ahead, past the law school on your right and Casa Italiana and the International Affairs Building on your left until you come to a short flight of steps going into the East Campus Residential Center. Take those steps, which will bring you to a security booth for East Campus Residential housing.

Show a picture ID to the guard and walk straight (north) through to the end of the courtyard. You will see the Heyman Center building in front of you.



**DIRECTIONS TO THE HEYMAN CENTER**  
**FROM 116TH ST AND AMSTERDAM AVE**

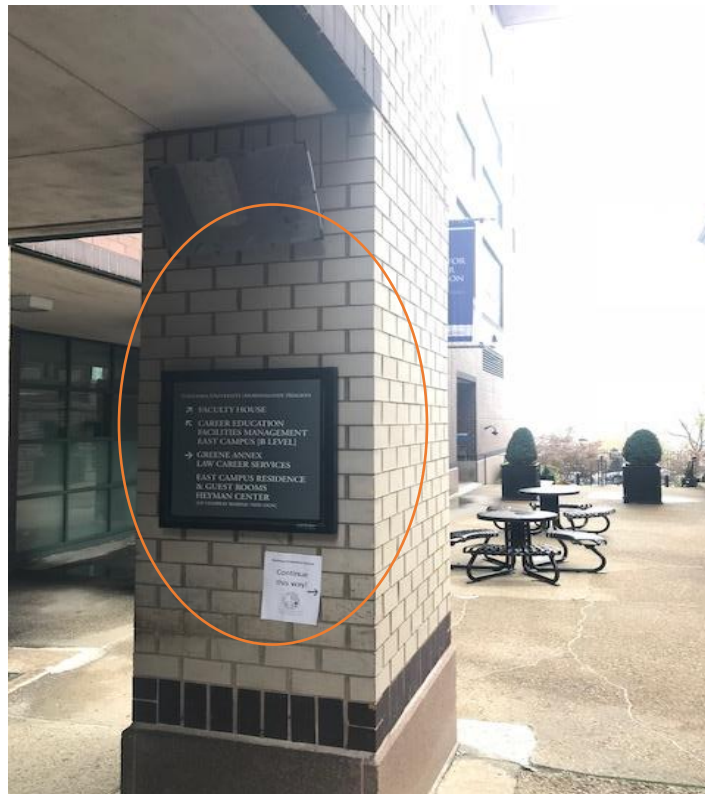
Enter at the gate at W. 116<sup>th</sup> Street, between Amsterdam Ave. and Morningside Drive. Walk through the courtyard, passing in front of Wien Hall:



Turn right at the end of the courtyard, where there is a large sign pointing toward Faculty House (see orange arrow below):



Walk about one hundred feet to the column pictured below and turn left toward a flight of stairs.



If you've passed the black tables/have reached another gate door, you've gone too far.



Go up the flight of stairs, and then immediately up another couple steps to a set of double glass doors. The entrance is labeled “East Campus Complex.”



In the lobby of the East Campus complex, check in with the guard seated at the guard turnstile.



He/she can direct you toward the Heyman Center, which is through another set of double glass doors.

Traverse the length of the courtyard (you can use the corridor pictured below, or walk through the central, uncovered courtyard.)



Our front door is at the center of the courtyard. Welcome to The Heyman Center for the Humanities!
